We work directly with **suppliers and providers** to support them on their journey to interoperable data and to provide independent **assurance of conformance** with our standards.


Together we are stronger – the combined views of our members, partners and stakeholders are welcomed and sought by national bodies and governments across the UK.

Why do we need information standards?





Recording information consistently

For information to flow between systems, it needs to be organised and recorded in the same way every time.


Agreed national standards and definitions must be used so that any computer can reproduce it with the same meaning.



Right place, right time

When information standards are implemented by care providers and their computer system suppliers, information will be recorded consistently across different settings.

This enables meaningful information to be made available to the right professionals at the right time, so it can be used to inform decisions about the care of the person.



Information tailored for different needs

Not everyone we interact with needs to see all the information in all these records to advise us on what tests we might need, or diagnose a condition, or meet our care and support needs, but they might need to see some information from more than one record.

BENEFITS OF INFORMATION STANDARDS



Patient

- Do not need to repeat their story
- Increased confidence in the care being provided
- Improved experience of care provision and improved outcomes
- Feel understood and listened to and that their preferences are taken into account
- Feel involved in decision making
- Enables patients to engage in their health and care via Person Held Records

Professional

- Access to usable care information, saves times, decreases duplication
- Confidence in the information provided to support care delivery
- Supports clinical decision support
- Consistent and accurate recording of information on medications, assessments, treatments, outcomes
- Share records with colleagues also supporting the patient's care

Wider System

- Vital for interoperability
- Meaningful data for service improvement, workforce planning, research, audit
- Informs population health management and strategic planning
- Supports mandatory national and local reporting datasets

Different types of information standards





Information record standards

- A specification for the structure and content of the information record for a given use
- Includes structured data and free text items in human readable form



Terminology standards

- Define the coded items and values in records e.g.diagnosis, allergies
- SNOMED CT is the most widely known example




Technical standards

- Define how a message is transported and shared digitally
- HL7 FHIR is the global industry standard





Care homes' view of the shared care record, Local authorities' information in SCR.





The Core Information Standard for Shared Care Records that support integrated care

Core Information Standard and the Shared Care Record



All our standards are aligned to ensure consistency and safe sharing of data





What the core information is... and what it isn't



It's **person-centred** – it's the key information that people want to share about themselves and their needs.



It's the person's medical and care history, interactions with services, current conditions, care plans and medications.



It will support care from birth to the end of life.



It's information that can be shared in real-time across health and social care services and with the individual themselves.



It will **not include all information** held about a person in every organisation across health and social care.

Core Information Standard



- The PRSB <u>Core Information Standard</u> (CIS) has been used as the standard against which Shared Care Record (ShCR) systems are being assessed.
- The standard defines a set of validated information that can potentially be shared between systems in different sites and settings, amongst health and care professionals using the service for the purpose of direct care.
- Orion Health has been awarded the PRSB Quality Mark for conformance with the Core Information Standard – the first supplier to achieve this watershed on the journey to interoperable shared care records.
- The Information Standards Notice (ISN) for the Core Information Standard will be published in Q4 2023.





The Personalised Care and Support Plan Standard

About Me



The essential standard for person-centred care and support

The About Me standard helps people share information about their needs and preferences with health and care professionals, so that staff can provide better, more person-centred care whenever and wherever it is needed. The information can include whatever the person feels is important to them and it complements data that already exists in a health and care record:



What is most important to me



People who are important to me



My preferred methods of communication





Please do and please don't



How and when to support me



Person taken to A&E with self-harm





A young woman is picked up by the police and taken to A&E at the local hospital as they think she is experiencing a mental health crisis. She has superficially self-harmed.

She is taken there by police who had been called, concerned for her safety.



She has been under the CMHT and has a personalised care and support plan that is available in her record that can be seen by the triage nurse who initially assesses her in A&E. The triage nurse can see her contingency (crisis) plan which lists her contacts and brief mental health history.



She can also see the wider management plan agreed with the young woman including the list of medications prescribed and overall therapeutic approach.

As a result of the assessment, she is seen by a member of the Psychiatric liaison team.



The team assess her. Her wounds have been dressed and she does not want to be admitted to hospital. She is able to assure the team she will try to remain safe.

Her family are contacted and she is able to go home with their support.

The Diabetes Standard

PRSB Diabetes Standard



By 2025, the number of people in the UK living with diabetes is expected to rise to 5.3 million.



PRSB Diabetes Standard



PRSB's Diabetes Record Information Standard aims to improve sharing of key information about a person's diabetes across primary, secondary, community and social care and the person themselves.

This also includes information that a person may record at home using apps

Access to this information means professionals can save time, prevent unnecessary tests and reduce clinical risks.





Implementing PRSB standards

Frameworks and legislations



English national policy, procurement frameworks and legislation require adoption of PRSB standards.

- What Good Looks Like requires all ICSs and trusts to have EPR by March 2025 (90% by 12/23), use the Core Information Standard to develop shared care records
- Procurement frameworks: PRSB is on the Health Systems Support Framework and the Adult Social Care framework.
- Information Standards Notices (ISNs)
- Data Protection and Digital Information Bill will enforce health and care suppliers to conform with standards. Legislation is expected in 2024.






The Standards Partnership Scheme


