The Branch continues to grow, both in terms of membership and the number and variety of events it offers. Membership now stands at 2,950, an increase of over 6% from last year, whilst attendance at the increasing number of Branch run or supported events is up, at over 8,000 (see the Branch Review for details of what we've been doing). - representing your Branch on IT groups throughout Greater Manchester.

Over the next year your Branch's committee will start looking for answers to the above questions from you. And if we do not, then perhaps you should be asking us why!

Finally, for making this a successful year, may I express my thanks to:

- the committee for all their endeavours over the year;
- Professor Nigel Linge and his team at Salford University for organising the Family Telecommunications Days;
- Lewis Endlar at MMU and MMU's Business School for assisting us with some of our events;
- Manchester University for organising another great Turing Lecture (and to the British government for saying sorry, though somewhat belatedly, for Turing's treatment);
- the various BCS and other engineering institutions that have worked with us during the year;
- the speakers at our events who have all given their time freely to the benefit of the profession.
