Young Professionals Group





Held throughout the North West these events are jointly co-ordinated by the Institutes of Mechanical Engineers (IMechE), Civil Engineers (ICE), Chemical Engineers (IChemE), Acoustics (IoA), Physics (IoP) and Engineering and Technology (IET), the Nuclear Institute and this Branch. The next events are on 16th (Bolton) and 23rd (Openshaw) October 2009.

The aim of this event is: to illustrate the diverse careers available to engineers; to encourage attendees to study engineering after leaving school or college; and to increase public awareness of the importance of engineering to society and the economy.



Futuresonic - the UK's leading festival for digital culture took place in Manchester back in May. It is an urban festival that was visited by 75,000 people, who engaged with 300 artists and 100 events across 30 venues.

An integral part of this festival is its acclaimed international conference, the Social Technologies Summit, sponsored by this Branch. This conference brought together futurologists, artists, researchers, technologists and scientists from the digital culture, technology and art communities together around shared issues to do with social media, society, art and the city.
