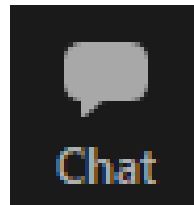
General & Specific

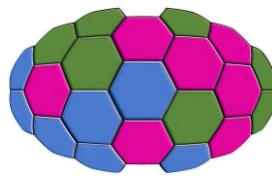

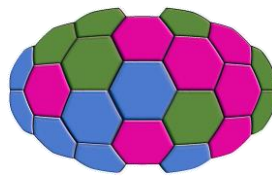
What really good methods, tools and techniques can you think of?

Who owns it? Can I use it?



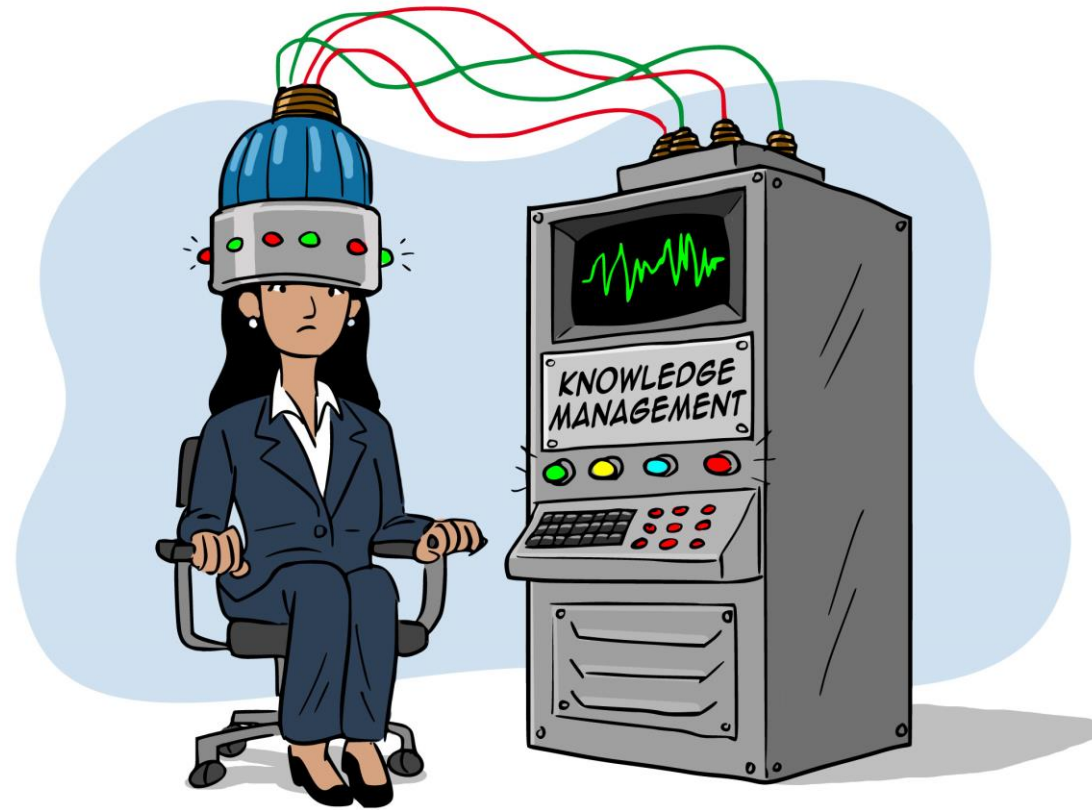
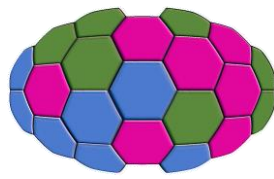
1. In the public domain and free to use, eg generic project management principles
2. You have to buy the manual, go on approved training, get certified, eg PRINCE II, Managing Successful Programmes (MSP)
3. Belongs to a specific organisation (eg consultancy, service supplier, software supplier) and can only be used with their participation and/or permission
4. Belongs to your client and is only for use on their work

Can I use the stuff I got from my previous clients?

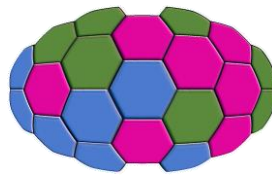


- Most useful things belong to someone and are their Intellectual Property (IP)
- If you created it yourself – it's probably your property unless your contract says it belongs to your employer or client
- But your client might think that if you did it for them it is their property
- Good idea to clarify (contractually in writing) what you can re-use and what belongs to the client
- Keep anything you are permitted to for future re-use or reference
- Never give away the client's know-how, competitive edge, corporate secrets or intellectual property

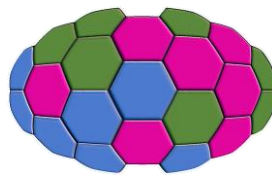

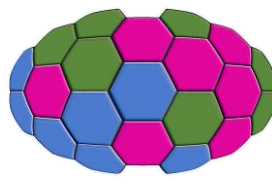
How useful are accreditations?
